



JSAP access for BSAVA members: Frequently asked questions

Q: I have found a JSAP article I want to read, how do I login to get access?

A: One of the advantages of the new JSAP login for BSAVA members is that you can find a JSAP article (e.g. by searching Wiley Online Library, or via Google Scholar, PubMed or other search engines) and then login to get access to that article without having to find the article again. To do this:

Click on the login button on Wiley Online Library and select 'Institutional Login':



The first time you do this, you will need to search for BSAVA via the institution search box:





On subsequent logins, BSAVA will be listed as a recent institution for you to select:



You will then be directed to the BSAVA login page and you should login with your usual BSAVA.com username and password. Once you have logged in, you will then be returned to the JSAP article with full access.

Q: I usually access JSAP by logging into BSAVA.com, will I still be able to do this?

A: Yes, there is a link on the usual JSAP login page <u>www.bsava.com/jsap</u> that you can use. Follow the instructions in option 1 and, when prompted, login with your usual BSAVA website login details.

Q: I usually access JSAP via the BSAVA Library, will that still be possible?

A: Yes, you can continue to login via the link at the bottom of the bsavalibrary.com/jsap page. You will need to be logged in, and a BSAVA member, for access to work.

You can also continue to search JSAP via the BSAVA Library. If you login, enter a search term, then click on the 'JSAP' tab on the search results page, you will be able to click to access any JSAP articles of interest.

Q: How do I use personal features such as 'add to favorites' and table of content alerts on Wiley Online Library?

A: As previously, use of these features requires a Wiley Online Library account – anyone can register for an account and use these features, but the WOL account won't give full access to JSAP articles, you will need to login as above for full access.

Q: Can I still download JSAP articles?

A: Yes, once logged in your access to JSAP will be the same as previously – it is just the login method that is changing.

Q: I already have an account on Wiley Online Library, do I need to change anything?

A: No, you can continue to use your existing WOL account to save favourite articles, manage table of contents alerts and so on, but unless your account gives you access to JSAP then you will need to use the above login method to access the full text of JSAP articles.

Q: I prefer to access JSAP via my institution, do I need to change anything?

A: No, if you prefer to continue to access JSAP via your institution that's fine, nothing will change.
